The college has developed the software for the examination branch, and is used for pre and post examination matters of all internal and external examinations, announcement of results and generation of marks memo etc. It enabled a centralized, secure and robust database of students. 3. <p>If yes, give a brief description and a list of modules currently operational (maximum 500 words)</p>	<p>The College purchased an ERP software package from M/s Mastersoft ERP Solutions Ltd., Nagpur. The modules for the automation of college transactions, subscribed to by the college, are as follows: 1. Academic (Student admissions, fee collection updating scholarship details) 2. Attendance 3. Library 4. Stores 5. Inward Outward 6. Online student fee collection The details are listed below: 1. Academic Module: It enables the application sale, student registration for new course, merit list generation, and student admission. The module supports right until the generation of TC and Bonafide certificate. Student fee challan is generated from this module and is reconciled with the software. It has the facility to let students/parents pay fee due amount online and get the receipt for the same on their email. 2. Attendance Module: The faculty members are provided login details to enter the monthly attendance of students in the software. Faculty members take the attendance reports and analyze the attendance performance of the students. Students are allowed to view their attendance through ERP software portal. 3. Library Module: The software provides all library functions like purchase of new books, maintenance of student and staff details, book issue and return operations, late fee maintenance and stock checking. 4. Stores Module: The module facilitates in maintaining complete details of college equipment, purchases, write offs and stock checking. 5. Inward and Outward Module: It supports office administration in maintaining correspondence details of inward and outward letters for future reference. The module provides the facility to approve and reply through different levels of management. 6. The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the college has a Facebook page, which updates all the information about the companies visiting the college for placements. Whenever a company visits the college for placements, the students who are interested in taking</p>

up the placements are required to register themselves in the link provided. This creates the data base of the students. 7. The IQAC has initiated the installation of a software called Examination Automation System (EAS), developed inhouse by the Department of Computer Science. The examination system of the college is automated and all the notifications about the exams are directly put up on the student portal in the college website. Two internal exams are conducted, out of which the first internal for all PG students is conducted online. Marks entry for the internals and assignment is done online by the teachers through the link provided by the examination branch. Implementation of integrated automated system helps in streamlining many activities of the examination branch right from the issue of exam forms to collection of examination fees, issue of receipts and tracking of cash flow. Results are declared online through college website, with marks memo mentioning the grades for non CBCS and SGPA for CBCS students.

#### 1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained
<p>Student feedback is being taken department wise for over a decade in the Institution. The college has used paperless feedback system for the first outgoing UG batch (20152018) of Autonomy. In order to enhance academic standards and upgrade curriculum as per current requirements, a structured</p>

questionnaire was circulated through Google forms to Students, Parents, Employers and Alumni. The feedback was analyzed by the Curriculum committee and members of the Statistics department. The findings were presented to a Core Committee comprising of Principal, Controller of Examinations, Faculty in charges, Heads of Departments, NCC and NSS Coordinators. Key areas of improvement were identified and the concerned faculty was asked to make changes in syllabus, teaching methodology and other activities. Analysis of feedback revealed that 80 of PG and UG students found the syllabus adequate and job oriented. 70 of students were satisfied with study material provided by the college. They, however, found it a little difficult to adapt to the semester system.

1. Students' Feedback and Action taken

a) Time Frame: Students suggested that the time between the last day of instruction and SEE should be increased and the short break time should be increased. Action Taken: Time gap between last day of instruction and SEE was already implemented and short break time was increased by 10 minutes.

b) Library facilities: More Reference books were suggested Action Taken: Annual Library budget was increased.

c) Practicals: Practical aspects to be included in BA Program Action Taken: The matter was discussed in BOS meeting and referred to the Management.

d) Curriculum: Overlapping topics between different courses in different semesters to be avoided and conduct of backlog examinations in odd semester Action Taken: Care has been taken by the BOS of various courses. Academic Council gave guidelines for conduct of Backlog examinations only in Even Semester 2.

Parents' Feedback and Action taken

a) Curriculum: Parents wanted more of practical aspects to be included in the programs and to increase use of ICT for better understanding. Action Taken: Syllabus has been framed according to UGC guidelines. Power point presentations and online classes have been included in the teaching methodology.

b) Time Gap: Parents suggested minimum of 2 day gap between examinations for SEE. Action Taken: It has been implemented by the Controller of Examinations.

3. Alumni Feedback and Action taken

Employability skills: Alumni suggested an increase in the number of field trips, inclusion of Computer programming languages, enhancement of Computers curriculum based on Industry requirements and inclusion of soft skills in curriculum. Action Taken: The suggestions have been implemented by BOS in the form of Skill Enhancement and Generic Elective Courses.

4. Industry feedback and Action taken

Industries like JP Morgan Chase Co., Wells Fargo, Infosys Limited, found the syllabus adequate. Biotechnology companies suggested an increase in number of field trips and Practical exposure to increase handson experience. Action Taken: Implemented by the BOS.

### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

BVC follows a well designed mentor-mentee system to provide guidance and overall support to students regarding academics, examinations and other matters. The mentor-mentee ratio in the college is 29.46 (3506 mentees and 119 mentors). Every class is assigned a class incharge who is responsible for disseminating information regarding academics, examinations, scholarships, events conducted in the college, inter and intra collegiate competitions, placement notices for final year UG and PG students, student progression (applicable to students who have passed out) and so on. The class incharge also takes care of student issues regarding adjustment to college environment (applicable to first year UG and PG students), academics, attendance, discipline, and other concerns related to student welfare. The class mentor maintains contact with parents whenever necessary, and counsels students in all aspects to facilitate overall personality development and also about different career options available. The class incharge also tries to bring out the latent talents in students by encouraging them to participate in curricular and extracurricular activities within and outside the college. The class incharge monitors the students' attendance and sends communication to the parents/guardians of students having attendance issues. The class incharge also talks to parents regarding student concerns and arranges for a meeting if necessary. A parent visit record is maintained in every department to record parent's meeting with class Incharge/HoD and other mentors. The class incharges of UG and PG final year maintain a student progression record that has details of the contact address, phone number and email ID, pass percentage, admission to higher studies or attainment of job. This helps the institution to maintain contact with passed out students to invite them for events, receiving prizes, giving guest lectures, and so on. Meetings are convened for class incharges from time to time to apprise them of the guidelines and changes that take place in the mentoring system, including updation or changes in the software for attendance entry, marks entry and so on. All the class incharges and Heads of the Departments are guided and advised by the Faculty Incharge. The Faculty Incharge, in turn, is guided by the Principal on various matters concerning students. The class incharge system ensures that every student has a referral point for any query or problem faced. This helps the students feel at home, especially if they are new to the college. WhatsApp groups have been created for all classes and communication is maintained online between the mentor and the mentees. This has proved to be invaluable for dissemination of information. The class incharge system has helped students to sail smoothly through their program completion in the college. The class incharges are like foster parents in the college, always ready to help and support students in whatever ways possible. This ensures a smooth and comfortable stay for mentees in the institution.

#### 4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory,

library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website)

BVC follows established procedures for maintenance and utilization of all infrastructural facilities. A. Maintenance (i) College buildings are maintained through regular checks and repairs every year. Furniture repairs are generally done during the summer vacation. The maintenance of classrooms, laboratories, including electrical fittings, is done as and when required. This is done on requisition from Heads of Departments/Faculty members who inform the Office Superintendent/ Administrative Assistant for the servicing/repair. (ii) The Head of Department proposes the annual budget for maintenance of departmental infrastructure for the academic year. It is then subject to approval by the finance committee and the College Management. (iii) Computers and reprographic facilities are maintained through AMCs. Laboratory equipment are serviced through AMCs annually /as per the need. (iv) Laboratory stock registers, library books, furniture, computers and electrical fittings are audited annually by the stock verification committee that consists of both teaching and administrative staff. The Security Officer from the Kendra office of Bharatiya Vidya Bhavan, Sainikpuri, oversees the annual laboratory stock checking. (v) A writeoff committee comprising of the Principal and 23 senior staff members is responsible for disposing computers, office/laboratory equipment and library books that cannot be repaired. B. Utilization (i) Common facilities such as seminar halls and auditorium are utilized by the entire college for academic/extracurricular activities. An Events register is maintained in the office in which all requirements are entered in advance by the concerned Incharge faculty. The Office Superintendent coordinates with the concerned faculty for optimum utilization of common facilities. (ii) The Timetable Committee looks into the allocation of computer labs for conducting UG and PG practical sessions. There is judicious use of the labs for presentations/seminars during free hours. The Career Guidance and Placement Cell (CGPC) uses seminar halls for conducting placement drives and computer labs to conduct online placement exams. Computers, printers/scanners are also provided to all departments as per the requirements. (iii) The Library Committee ensures upgradation and optimum utilization of library resources. Purchase of books and journals is done regularly based on requirement. The library is also equipped with computers having internet facility to be used by students for projects and assignments. The library is optimally utilized by students during the scheduled library hour or during their free time. (iv) The college has good sports facilities for both intercollege and intracollege competitions. The well-equipped college gymnasium is used by staff and students either before college hours or after college hours for fitness training and Yoga sessions. The spacious basketball court, soft ball court and football ground are utilized by students for regular practice between 6AM to 8AM and 4PM - 6PM. The Physical Education Department maintains a Sports Attendance Register for students. The department also has facilities for Indoor games availed by students and staff during free hours. The Physical Director allots the football ground and basketball/softball courts to students on a rotation basis, based on entry in the Log Register. Students can avail sports material by entry in an Issue Register maintained by the Department of Physical

It integrates all activities of the library by using CCMS CloudR1.1. ICT: The deployment of advanced facilities, including ICT, is done by routinely updating the hardware and software. 8 additional classrooms were provided with LCD and LAN facilities. Of the 343 computers, 40 were replaced by new ones with i3 configuration.

Infrastructure/Instrumentation: The academic infrastructure was augmented with a research lab and a common instrumentation lab, and sports infrastructure with the construction of Silver Jubilee Sports Complex.

Teaching and Learning

The college has introduced several measures to enhance learning experience of students. The college has implemented student centric methods such as cooperative learning, industrial visits, case study analysis, role play and subject quiz to bring about effective learning experience. The faculty also makes use of various ICT tools and resources like Internet Browser, LCD projectors, Youtube videos, Eresources and techniques to enhance quality of teaching and learning. The college has introduced Skill Enhancement and Interdisciplinary courses to help students attain allround development and meet the demands of industry.

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

(a) Mode of transport: The nearest RTC bus stop is about 0.5 km from the college, and the local railway station is 3 km away. Students and employees who live in the neighborhood come to the college either on foot or on bicycles those who live at distant places commute daily by public transport or motorcycles / cars. A recent survey conducted to quantify the use of different modes has revealed that 0.72 of the students and staff use bicycles, 5.74 walk to college, and 35.3 use public transports. It is presumed that the rest commute by motorbikes or cars (b) Plastic free campus: Use of plastic bags below 50 microns is banned in the campus. The canteen is instructed to discontinue usage and stocking up of single use plastic or plastic coated items or any other banned plastic articles. 'NO PLASTIC' boards are displayed all over the college to create awareness among students about the curse of plastic use. Separate dustbins for plastic materials are placed around the campus for its proper disposal. (c) Paperless office: Most of the office correspondence, records and filing has been computerized, reducing paper usage. As an initiative to reduce the use of paper in the examinations, CIA tests for post graduate students are conducted online. The CGPC of the college conducts eligibility tests for the final year students online. Messages related to important meetings, dates, unexpected holidays, and any other related information are sent to all the members of the college through bulk SMS and WhatsApp. The college website is updated with the latest information pertaining to academics, examinations, seminars, workshops, field trips, competitions, and activity reports. A photo gallery is also available on the website. Bulk SMS and emails are used for official communication. (d) Green landscaping with trees and plants: The campus is lush green with trees rich in medicinal values,

such as ashwagandha, neem, areca palm, bottle brush, ornamental, bauhinia, Cassia, Delonix, Jacaranda, Tecoma, Tabebuia, Cymbopogon citratus, emblica, lagerstroemia, Ocimum gratissimum, pagada. The management encourages the students and staff to regularly participate in tree plantation programs on the campus.

On 23rd July 2016, Government of Telangana and Hyderabad Metro Railway identified the college to initiate 'Harita Haram', and organized a tree plantation program on the campus wherein nearly 300 saplings, including few medicinal plants, were planted. (<https://youtu.be/dHeiXif8qVo>) (e) Other green practices: The College implements several other green practices to make the students conscious of environmental sustainability. They are (i) Introduction of a compulsory course on 'Environmental Studies'. (ii) Organizing an exhibition and sale of ecofriendly biodegradable Ganesh idols. (iii) Handmade 'rakhi'.

## 7.2 – Best Practices

### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

**Best Practice I**

1. Title of the practice: Conducting 'Placement Eligibility Test (PET)
2. Objectives of the Practice: To assess the proficiency in quantitative abilities and soft skills of the UG and PG final year students, and To offer special training to reduce the gap between industry expectations and the program outcome.
3. The Context: The average percent of UG and PG final year students who are selected in the campus placement drives used to be about 40 till the year 2014-15. Though some students had excellent academic record, they were not selected in the campus recruitment drives because their soft skills were found slightly below the standard expected by the industry. The college, therefore, needed to identify such students and the areas of deficiency in advance, and train them distinctly in resume writing, personality development, aptitude building, communication skills, group discussions, interview skills etc. Hence, PET was designed to assess the soft skills of the students before they attended the campus interviews.
4. The Practice: The Career Guidance and Placement Cell (CGPC) of the college has designed an online test named 'Placement Eligibility Test (PET)'. It is conducted every year in the months of June/July for all the final year students who are interested in seeking a job through the campus recruitment drive. The students who do not qualify the PET have to undergo a 30-hour training program called 'Employability Skill Development Program (ESDP)' to become eligible for placements. The curriculum includes topics on: Quantitative ability Verbal Ability Reasoning Evaluation Mechanism Basic Communication Skills Personality Development Psychometric Test Group Discussion Interview Skills A workshop on industry scenario and employability
5. Evidence of Success: This practice proved to be highly effective as the success rate of the students selected in industry has improved to 60 in the past 3 years, and a large number of students were selected by reputed companies like EY, DELOITTE, AMAZON, WIPRO, SAP, COGNIZANT, FRANKLIN TEMPLETON, HSBC, UBER, JARO, Sutherland, ADP, INFOSYS, ICICI securities, AGS, RYAN, GENPACT, DeShaw, FactSet, KPMG. The highest salary offered to a student in the year 2017 - 18 is Rs. 6,00,000 per annum, and the average being Rs. 2,88,060. The college received a highly favorable feedback from the participants of the program, and the employers. Some comments are:  
Gained confidence to attend the recruitment processes of the companies, Training in group discussion and interview skills has resulted in improved performance, Quantitative and verbal ability training helped to qualify in various competitive examinations, Helped in developing aptitude and enhancing abilities to prepare and focus on career development.
6. Problems Encountered and Resource Required: Students from rural background need more support in soft skills and Spoken English and it is a challenge to make them placement ready. The College is making efforts to conduct special training for them in the English Language Lab. Time and Budget constraints to elevate the program to the

next level in terms of providing more expert lectures and realtime facilities, Funds crunch for subsidizing the program for students from the lower wealth group. Best Practice II

1. Title of the practice: Promotion of 'Scholastic Clubs' in the departments
2. Objectives of the Practice: To provide a platform for the students to showcase their scholastic and cocurricular talents in fine arts, music, theatre, Debating, cultural events, hobbies etc., and Cultivate scientific zeal to expand the boundaries of their creativity.
3. The Context: BVC recognizes the fact that a student is a repository of some innate talent / skill inherited from the environment in which he/she has grown up. The college believes in nurturing that talent / skill, and helping in honing and sharing it with peers. It is achieved by encouraging interaction among the students at two levels - interclass (at the college level) and intraclass (at the department level). Several 'Student Clubs' have been formed for this purpose, specializing in activities like photography, finearts, drama, debating, folklore dances, quiz, science, management etc. Joining a student club provides an opportunity for a student to discover his/her capabilities learn team spirit, group discipline, networking and watch how his/her peers handle the issue in similar situations all of it contributing to making a rounded personality and a good citizen. The most rewarding aspect of this practice, however, is 'relax while you learn'.
4. The Practice: The objective is achieved by forming the following student clubs, each of which is unique in its activity and monitored by a teaching department in the college: Xpressionz (The Cultural Literary club) The club gives the students a platform to showcase and nurture their talents in the field of music, dance, fine arts and theatre. It organizes Inter and Intra College fests and also celebrates various regional and national festivals. Bhavan's Quiz Club - 'Manthan' - is unique in its form. It conducts Intercollegiate quiz competitions, which is also open for the corporates. Centre for Excellence - An organization started exclusively for students of the College in association with Ramakrishna Math (Vivekananda Institute of Human Excellence). Various events and competitions are organized to signify the importance of human values and patriotism among the youth. Students from all streams (UG PG) are welcome to participate and discover themselves.
