15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Bhavans Vivekananda College of Science, Humanities, and Commerce is undergoing transformative changes to align its operations with the vision of the National Education Policy (NEP). The NEP emphasizes delivering high-quality education and cultivating human resources as global citizens. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) initiated discussions with faculty members, prompting the introduction of multidisciplinary programs. In response to these directives, the college launched Honors programs, including Data Science and Business Analytics. A proposal was presented to overhaul elective courses with a multidisciplinary approach, integrating humanities and science with STEM through Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC). The college introduced courses such as Gender Sensitization, Environmental Studies, Information Technology, Psychology, Renewable Energy, Nutrition and Health, Biotechnology, Mathematics, and Statistics, spanning various disciplines. Adhering to the NEP's vision, the institution offers flexible and innovative curricula, implementing a Choice-Based Credit System for all undergraduate and postgraduate programs. As part of the Department of Biotechnology's STAR College scheme, interdisciplinary projects were assigned to students, contributing to holistic and multidisciplinary education. Faculty members were encouraged to engage in hands-on training, workshops, and seminars related to Multiple Entry and Exit Programs (MEEP), with a proposal submitted for its implementation in statutory bodies. The college is at the forefront of endorsing a multidisciplinary approach in line with NEP 2020. Interdepartmental research is actively promoted, resulting in numerous interdisciplinary paper publications and patent releases over the past two years. Additionally, the introduction of Skill Enhancement Courses, professional ethics, Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) and Patenting, research ethics, and various value-added courses demonstrates the institution's commitment to excellence.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The establishment implemented Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) for all postgraduate programs, utilizing National Schemes like NPTEL, with credits seamlessly transferred towards degree completion. Currently, the institution is in the stages of enlisting in the Academic Bank of Credits, a pivotal element in the National Education Policy (NEP) of 2020. Functioning as an Autonomous college with a choice-based credit system, faculty members are empowered to

craft their own curricula and pedagogical methods, adhering to the guidelines set by the parent university and UGC norms. The college upholds a structured examination system endorsed by the Academic Council and Board of Studies, encompassing both continuous internal assessments and semester-end examinations.

17.Skill development:

The college is currently in the process of formulating the Credit Framework to implement the National Education Policy (NEP). The institution enhances the overall development of students by offering Soft Skills Certification programs through the CGPC cell, augmenting their knowledge, skills, and aptitude. In alignment with the National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF), the Placement Cell conducts Campus Recruitment Training (CRT classes) to prepare students for internship and placement interviews. The college currently provides various Skill Enhancement Courses. Bhavans Vivekananda College (BVC) actively facilitates Internship programs, On Job Training, Personality Development programs, hands-on training, and certificate programs, equipping students with workplace-related skills and attitudes. Collaborative agreements (MoUs) with national institutes like NSIC, IICT, NSE, Institute of Genetics, etc., enable the college to offer diverse laboratory and entrepreneurship skills to students. The Entrepreneurship Development (ED) cell of BVC, in partnership with MSME, India, focuses on nurturing entrepreneurial skills among students. BVC emphasizes value-based education by encouraging student participation in NCC, NSS, BSG, and Outreach programs. Various cells and clubs, such as the Women's Cell, Centre for Excellence Cell, Green Campus Program, and scholastic clubs, organize sensitization programs to instill ethics, morals, values, scientific temper, environmental consciousness, and life skills in students.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The undergraduate curriculum is a vibrant fusion of Indian heritage and culture, offering Sanskrit as a second language to all students. It integrates teachings from revered texts such as the Taittiriya Upanishad and Brihadaranyaka Upanishad. Moreover, it illuminates the contributions of pioneers like Aryabhatta, Kannada, Bhaskaracharya, and Sri Adi Sankaracharya across various fields. Emphasizing ancient culture, the curriculum delves into epics like the Ramayana, highlighting the leadership and virtues of Lord Srirama, alongside narratives like Dhruvopakyanam and Katopanishad. The college fosters cultural awareness through its heritage club, which elucidates the significance of major festivals like Gurupoornima.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Since 2017, the college has been implementing Outcome-Based Education (OBE) with a structured mechanism for measuring Course Outcomes (COs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Programme Outcomes (POs). Following the PDCA (Plan, Do, Check, Action) model, the college ensures the continuous improvement of Outcome-Based Education. In the planning phase (Plan), the focus is on defining Programme Outcomes, Programme Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes. The execution phase (Do) involves preparing Academic Organizers, planning teaching methods, and developing teaching aids. The checking phase (Check) includes assessments, continuous internal assessments, semester-end examinations, seminars, quizzes, and assignments. The action phase (Action) emphasizes continuous improvement, curriculum revision, and changes in teaching methodology. The college conducts attainment analysis of courses and programs, facilitating mid-course adjustments and improvements in curriculum, teaching-learning methods, teaching resource requirements, assessment methods, and the reliability of evaluation procedures. Each Course Outcome is mapped to Programme Outcomes/Programme Specific Outcomes (POs/PSOs) using a CO-PO Matrix, assigning correlation values on a scale of 1 to 3 (ascending order: 3 being the highest, 2 being moderate, and 1 being the lowest). The correlation between the average of all COs and POs/PSOs determines the CO target value. The Course-PO matrix is established by mapping the average course outcome of each course across all semesters to POs/PSOs. The average values for all courses against each PO provide the PO target values. The course attainment level is measured at the end of each semester, while the program attainment level is assessed upon completion of a graduate program. The Programme Matrix is derived from the Course-PO mapping value and the Course Outcome attainment value for each course. Analyzing the gap between PO attainment and PO target guides the curriculum redesigning process for the program.

20.Distance education/online education:

A robust 'Learning Management System (LMS)' was implemented to seamlessly integrate technology into virtual teaching, evaluation processes, and scaling. An interoperable digital infrastructure was established to support this initiative. Faculty members underwent training on various platforms for online teaching, e-learning, and evaluation. Students were guided on gadget usage, and the effectiveness of online teaching was systematically assessed and standardized based on feedback. These measures enabled the smooth conduct of classes and examinations throughout the academic year 2020-21. Amid the pandemic, the college adopted a blended approach

to teaching, combining the traditional 'chalk and duster' method with technology-driven online methods. Blended learning was further enhanced by incorporating online courses from Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) into the curriculum. The college library underwent full automation using an Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), encompassing activities such as acquisition, cataloging, serial control, barcoding of books, circulation, and the implementation of an Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC).

The curriculum is meticulously designed to meet societal needs, emphasizing experiential learning, scientific acumen, creative and lateral thinking, managerial proficiency, and entrepreneurial spirit.

Global competence is fostered through multifaceted approaches, including communication skills in English and French, and comprehensive courses covering international business, financial management, HRM, foreign trade, accounting, derivatives, economics, Python, business analytics, intelligence, data visualization, quantitative analysis, biochemistry, rDNA technology, SPSS, R-Programming, MATLAB, machine learning, operations research, mathematical modeling, bioinformatics, IPR, nano biotechnology, AI, cloud computing, IoT, big data analytics, network security, microbiology, environmental science, research methodology, cheminformatics, spectroscopy, chromatography, and medicinal chemistry.

Contributing to national development, courses encompass Indian economy, political science, labor and business laws, business economics, entrepreneurial development, accounting standards, GST, income tax, financial management, security and portfolio analysis management. Skill enhancement includes generic electives, MOOCs, and value-added courses, with linguistic proficiency in Hindi and Sanskrit.

Regionally and locally, the curriculum delves into Telangana economy, Telugu, organic farming, regional rural banks, banking, medical microbiology, immunology, and clinical microbiology. Integrating domain competence with the preservation of local culture ensures holistic skill development, addressing local, regional, national, and global needs while facilitating on-the-job training.

In our institution, characterized by a diverse student body exhibiting varying levels of learning capabilities, a range of instructional approaches is employed to discern both slow and fast learners. Assessment of student performance in Continuous Internal Assessments (CIAs) and assignments, active participation in classroom activities, hands-on engagement in practical work, and mentor feedback collectively form the basis for this differentiation. For Advanced Learners, tailored strategies involve guiding them to enrol in value-added courses, delivering audio-visual presentations on software development, fostering a passion for research through real-time project implementation, presentation of research papers at conferences/seminars on collegiate, state, national, and international platforms, and publication of articles in esteemed journals. These students are also motivated to partake in state and national intercollegiate cultural and academic competitions, resulting in numerous accolades. Conversely, for Slow Learners, a peer learning strategy is implemented, with advanced learners serving as guides. Bridge courses are conducted to address knowledge gaps, and faculty provides self-learning materials tailored to their needs. Participation in clubs, encouragement of group assignments, and personalized counselling by mentors create a supportive environment for their academic development.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences:

The objective of teaching being learner Centric, various methodologies of teaching for better teaching -learning experience is used based on Experiential, Participative and Problem-Solving learning. Experiential Learning encompasses a wide spectrum of activities, including Virtual Labs, hands-on laboratory experiences, internships, value added courses, outreach programs and the use of software like MS Office, Tally, SPSS, R-Programming, Multisim, MATLAB etc. It also involves participation in webinars, guest lectures, virtual tours, financial statement analysis, tax calculations, tax return filing, simulation modules, project work, and documentary production, English Language Practice with Software 'Issues in English 2' Language based competitions, Mobile Assisted language learning, Listening Skills, Storytelling/writing, Hands-on activities like article, book and film review, Typing Aids, Audio Recording for Speaking Skills, assistance of Bluetooth Speakers, Online Editors for SQL(Structured Query Language).Participative Learning adopts dynamic approaches such as role-playing, debates, case studies, flipped classroom methods, quizzes, short film creation, poster presentations, seminars, collaborative work using tools like Padlet, involvement in club activities, crossword puzzles, peer learning coaching, practical sessions, model making, awareness programs, Creative writing, Film, Book and Capsule Review, Reading and Speaking Skills and Debates. Field visits are also part of the Participative Learning. Furthermore, students' problem-solving abilities are honed through research projects, publications and presentations, and conducting various surveys.

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT-enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning

Utilizing ICT-enabled tools and online resources, teachers enhance the efficacy of the teaching and learning experience, with these highly potent tools playing a crucial role in the educational processes of the institution. Some of the unique tools used in the college are, online editors for SQL, C, CPP, Java, html, Python, Animaker for creating Advertisements, Final Cut Pro Editing Software, Easy Voice Recorder, VN Video Editor. The students use virtual labs, Software- 'Issues in English', which is used in the English lab for the practice of LSRW Skills for the students, Typing Aids, Audio Recording for Speaking Skills practice, and Mobile Assisted Language Learning, Open-Source Simulators and Mentimeter. Other platforms like Google Classroom, WhatsApp, Email, OneNote, and Moodle are also used. Facilities like Inflibnet and Delnet, available in the library, enable the use of E-resources by students and teachers. Virtual labs such as Labster, Online tools like RNA fold webserver for bioinformatics and Colab notebooks for Biopython were used. Furthermore, Animation Videos, Draw IO, ChemDraw, Wise Mapping and Excel Sheets (graphs) are some of the tools used by the faculty to visualize data. Students also interned in other organizations. The curricula for all the 22 programmes in the college are designed and developed by the respective faculty members and the stakeholders, in compliance with the objectives of OBE as per the UGC guidelines, with the approval in the BoS meetings. Course Outcomes (COs) are articulated statements that explicitly delineate subject knowledge, as well as the abilities and skills required to apply that knowledge. These statements encompass the overall competencies that students are anticipated to achieve upon completing the program of study. The importance of OBE is sensitized among the students by the Head of the Department and faculty members at various platforms. Syllabus and Program wise POs and COs are displayed on the website for the information to all the stakeholders. Additionally, information is periodically reiterated on notice boards and discussed by faculty members. Furthermore, the newly recruited faculty members are sensitized about the OBE by HODs. The evaluation of each Course Outcome involves the use of direct assessment tools, which gauge students' knowledge and skills through their performance in Continuous Internal Assessments/Assignments/Concept Tests/Rubrics, and similar measures.

Achievement of each PO and PSO will be calculated by taking the cumulative average of all the courses through Direct Assessment tools, after the completion of CO-PO mapping.

The gap between PO attainment and PO target is analyzed for redesigning curriculum of the programme.

RESEARCH, INNOVATIONS AND EXTENSION

3.1 - Promotion of Research and Facilities

3.1.1 - The institution's research facilities are frequently updated and there is a well-defined policy for promotion of research which is uploaded on the institutional website and implemented

Research Consultancy and Extension Cell (RCEC) strives to execute the research policy of the college for promotion of quality research. Professors from Hyderabad Central University and Osmania University are inducted as Advisory members. Committee was reconstituted with new members.

College promotes research by providing financial support to Minor Research Project as seed money. Research proposals from the faculty were called and screened by Panel of Research Advisory members. Total 11 project proposals were sanctioned with Rs.4.8 Lakhs as seed money out of 13 proposals received. A faculty member from Microbiology department is sanctioned with research funding of Rs. 0.45 Lakhs from UGC DAE-CSR project. For the academic year 2022-2023, the college was sanctioned with DBT STAR college scheme under strengthening component for another two years.

Faculty members are recommended to publish their research work only in UGC Care listed journals/ Scopus and Web of Science. Research output of the college for this year is 19 research papers published in Scopus /Web of Science Journals, 11 research papers presented in International conferences,12 textbooks and 8 book chapters were published. Significant increase in number of Indian patent publications i.e 10 was made from the Departments - Computer Science, Commerce, Mathematics & Statistics and Management Studies.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

The college is situated on a sprawling campus of 10 acres. Teaching and support departments are spread across seven separate buildings with a total floor area of 13,757 sq.mts. In addition, another floor of 7550 sft in the new block is added during 2022-23. The college has 68 classrooms with WiFi, 32 laboratories, computer center, 3 research laboratories, general instrument facilities, library, 2 seminar halls, 3 auditoriums, media center, etc. to facilitate teaching and learning. The computer facilities are frequently updated to meet the needs of technology-enhanced learning. During 2022-23, 80 new computers and 11 LCD projectors were added. All the computers have the required licensed/open source software installed. All laboratories are spacious, well-equipped and well-maintained. Media center facilities include studio and editing suite featuring a fully sound proof studio with industry standard lighting and green pads for recording lecture videos, interviews, podcasts, audio recordings and the production of radio, TV and news programs.

This proprietary product from Mastersoft ERP Solutions Pvt Ltd., Nagpur, operates as a web-based application accessed through LAN/WAN and Wi-Fi networks within the college.

With 17 computer systems featuring LAN facilities, the library provides seamless information access and management. Additionally, the library is well-equipped with an e-library housing 2,00,000+ e-books, 11,300 e-journals, and subscriptions/memberships to prominent databases such as N-List-INFLIBNET, DELNET, NDLI Club, and CMIE. Services also extend to remote access through N-List, Union Catalogue - DELNET/ILL (Interlibrary Loan), and the National Digital Library of India, accessible via the college website and mobile app.

Furthermore, the library enhances accessibility through MOPAC (Mobile OPAC), a mobile app installed using MasterSoft, catering to the convenience of both students and staff. This integration of ILMS

and the utilization of advanced technologies showcase the HEI's commitment to providing a modern, efficient, and user-friendly library experience for its academic community.

College implements comprehensive waste management facilities to address both degradable and non-degradable waste. These facilities are designed to promote environmental sustainability, waste reduction, and responsible disposal.

Separate bins are provided for degradable and non-degradable waste in various locations across the campus. For degradable waste, composting units are established to facilitate the natural decomposition of organic materials. Compost generated from organic matter is used for landscaping or as a nutrient-rich soil conditioner. Paper is recycled annually under MoU with ITC.

Non-degradable waste, such as metal is sent for recycling, plastic and glass are collected and disposed. Specialized bins/collection points are set up to handle electronic waste (e-waste), including old computers, printers, and other electronic devices. E-waste is carefully managed and sent to certified recycling facilities through MoU with Envirocare Pvt Ltd to extract valuable materials and prevent environmental contamination.

Green chemistry protocols are followed to minimise the use of hazardous chemicals in laboratories. Standard Operations procedures are followed for safe disposal of chemicals in all laboratories. Incinerators are installed in all girls' washrooms for proper disposal of sanitary waste.

These students are also motivated to partake in state and national intercollegiate cultural and academic competitions, resulting in numerous accolades. Conversely, for Slow Learners, a peer learning strategy is implemented, with advanced learners serving as guides. Bridge courses are conducted to address knowledge gaps, and faculty provides self-learning materials tailored to their needs. Participation in clubs, encouragement of group assignments, and personalized counselling by mentors create a supportive environment for their academic development.

Experiential Learning encompasses a wide spectrum of activities, including Virtual Labs, hands-on laboratory experiences, internships, value added courses, outreach programs and the use of software like MS Office, Tally, SPSS, R-Programming, Multisim, MATLAB etc. It also involves participation in webinars, guest lectures, virtual tours, financial statement analysis, tax calculations, tax return filing, simulation modules, project work, and documentary production, English Language Practice with Software 'Issues in English 2' Language based competitions, Mobile Assisted language learning, Listening Skills, Storytelling/writing, Hands-on activities like article, book and film review, Typing Aids, Audio Recording for Speaking Skills, assistance of Bluetooth Speakers, Online Editors for SQL(Structured Query Language).Participative Learning adopts dynamic approaches such as role-playing, debates, case studies, flipped classroom methods, quizzes, short film creation, poster presentations, seminars, collaborative work using tools like Padlet, involvement in club activities, crossword puzzles, peer learning coaching, practical sessions,

model making, awareness programs, Creative writing, Film, Book and Capsule Review, Reading and Speaking Skills and Debates. Field visits are also part of the Participative Learning. Furthermore, students' problem-solving abilities are honed through research projects, publications and presentations, and conducting various surveys.

Utilizing ICT-enabled tools and online resources, teachers enhance the efficacy of the teaching and learning experience, with these highly potent tools playing a crucial role in the educational processes of the institution. Some of the unique tools used in the college are, online editors for SQL, C, CPP, Java, html, Python, Animaker for creating Advertisements, Final Cut Pro Editing Software, Easy Voice Recorder, VN Video Editor. The students use virtual labs, Software- 'Issues in English', which is used in the English lab for the practice of LSRW Skills for the students, Typing Aids, Audio Recording for Speaking Skills practice, and Mobile Assisted Language Learning, Open-Source Simulators and Mentimeter. Other platforms like Google Classroom, WhatsApp, Email, OneNote, and Moodle are also used. Facilities like Inflibnet and Delnet, available in the library, enable the use of E-resources by students and teachers. Virtual labs such as Labster, Online tools like RNA fold webserver for bioinformatics and Colab notebooks for Biopython were used. Furthermore, Animation Videos, Draw IO, ChemDraw, Wise Mapping and Excel Sheets (graphs) are some of the tools used by the faculty to visualize data. Students also interned in other organizations. The curricula for all the 22 programmes in the college are designed and developed by the respective faculty members and the stakeholders, in compliance with the objectives of OBE as per the UGC guidelines, with the approval in the BoS meetings. Course Outcomes (COs) are articulated statements that explicitly delineate subject knowledge, as well as the abilities and skills required to apply that knowledge. These statements encompass the overall competencies that students are anticipated to achieve upon completing the program of study. The importance of OBE is sensitized among the students by the Head of the Department and

faculty members at various platforms. Syllabus and Program wise POs and COs are displayed on the website for the information to all the stakeholders. Additionally, information is periodically reiterated on notice boards and discussed by faculty members. Furthermore, the newly recruited faculty members are sensitized about the OBE by HODs. The evaluation of each Course Outcome involves the use of direct assessment tools, which gauge students' knowledge and skills through their performance in Continuous Internal Assessments/Assignments/Concept Tests/Rubrics, and similar measures.

3.1 - Promotion of Research and Facilities

3.1.1 - The institution's research facilities are frequently updated and there is a well-defined policy for promotion of research which is uploaded on the institutional website and implemented

Research Consultancy and Extension Cell (RCEC) strives to execute the research policy of the college for promotion of quality research. Professors from Hyderabad Central University and Osmania University are inducted as Advisory members. Committee was reconstituted with new members.

College promotes research by providing financial support to Minor Research Project as seed money. Research proposals from the faculty were called and screened by Panel of Research Advisory members. Total 11 project proposals were sanctioned with Rs.4.8 Lakhs as seed money out of 13 proposals received. A faculty member from Microbiology department is sanctioned with research funding of Rs. 0.45 Lakhs from UGC DAE-CSR project. For the academic year 2022-2023, the college was sanctioned with DBT STAR college scheme under strengthening component for another two years.

Faculty members are recommended to publish their research work only in UGC Care listed journals/ Scopus and Web of Science. Research output of the college for this year is 19 research papers published in Scopus /Web of Science Journals, 11 research papers presented in International conferences,12 textbooks and 8 book chapters were published. Significant increase in number of Indian patent publications i.e 10 was made from the Departments - Computer Science, Commerce, Mathematics & Statistics and Management Studies.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipments, etc.

The college is situated on a sprawling campus of 10 acres. Teaching and support departments are spread across seven separate buildings with a total floor area of 13,757 sq.mts. In addition, another floor of 7550 sft in the new block is added

during 2022-23. The college has 68 classrooms with WiFi, 32 laboratories, computer center, 3 research laboratories, general instrument facilities, library, 2 seminar halls, 3 auditoriums, media center, etc. to facilitate teaching and learning. The computer facilities are frequently updated to meet the needs of technology-enhanced learning. During 2022-23, 80 new computers and 11 LCD projectors were added. All the computers have the required licensed/open source software installed. All laboratories are spacious, well-equipped and well-maintained. Media center facilities include studio and editing suite featuring a fully sound proof studio with industry standard lighting and green pads for recording lecture videos, interviews, podcasts, audio recordings and the production of radio, TV and news programs.

Additionally, the library is well-equipped with an e-library housing 2,00,000+ e-books, 11,300 e-journals, and subscriptions/memberships to prominent databases such as N-List-INFLIBNET, DELNET, NDLI Club, and CMIE. Services also extend to remote access through N-List, Union Catalogue - DELNET/ILL (Interlibrary Loan), and the National Digital Library of India, accessible via the college website and mobile app.

Furthermore, the library enhances accessibility through MOPAC (Mobile OPAC), a mobile app installed using MasterSoft, catering to the convenience of both students and staff. 6.3 - Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 - The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for their career development/ progression

- 12 days of Casual Leave is provided to the regular/contract teaching and non-teaching staff.
- The confirmed employees are entitled to leave on medical

certificate or leave on private affairs for 15 days with half pay for every completed year of service.

- Maternity leave to female staff, 50% fee concession to class IV employees' children, and annual health check-up at reasonable rates are provided to all the staff.
- Canteen facilities at reasonable prices are provided for the staff and students.
- Two pairs of uniforms and shoes are provided to the class IV employees every year.
- Residential Quarters are provided on request, for few Non-Teaching Staff as the number of quarters is limited.

College implements comprehensive waste management facilities to address both degradable and non-degradable waste. These facilities are designed to promote environmental sustainability, waste reduction, and responsible disposal.

Separate bins are provided for degradable and non-degradable waste in various locations across the campus. For degradable waste, composting units are established to facilitate the natural decomposition of organic materials. Compost generated from organic matter is used for landscaping or as a nutrient-rich soil conditioner. Paper is recycled annually under MoU with ITC.

Non-degradable waste, such as metal is sent for recycling, plastic and glass are collected and disposed. Specialized bins/collection points are set up to handle electronic waste (e-waste), including old computers, printers, and other electronic devices. E-waste is carefully managed and sent to certified recycling facilities through MoU with Envirocare Pvt Ltd to extract valuable materials and prevent environmental contamination.

Green chemistry protocols are followed to minimise the use of hazardous chemicals in laboratories. Standard Operations procedures are followed for safe disposal of chemicals in all laboratories. Incinerators are installed in all girls' washrooms for proper disposal of sanitary waste.

Awareness campaigns and educational programs are conducted to inform students, faculty, and staff about the importance of waste management.
