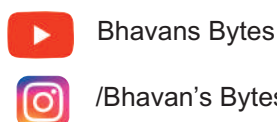




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Orientation Session for the 2023-24 Batch

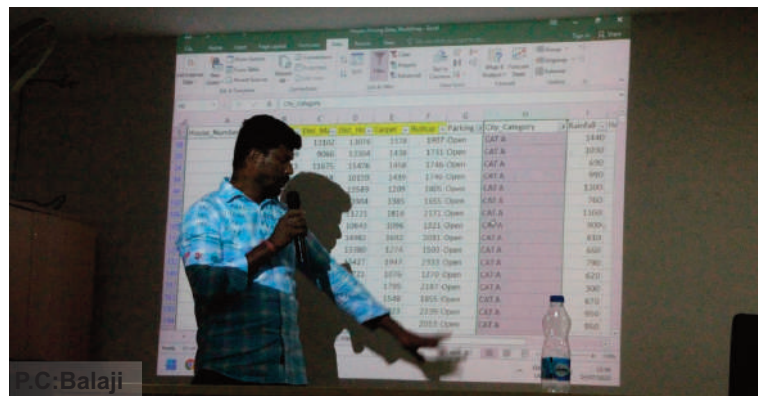
The department of management studies of the college organized "MS Excel workshop basics" for the second year students of BBA.

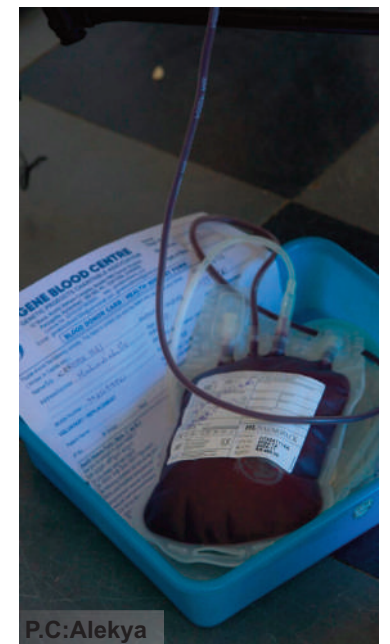

In the third week of August i.e. from 12th August to 18th August 2023, the college conducted an awareness

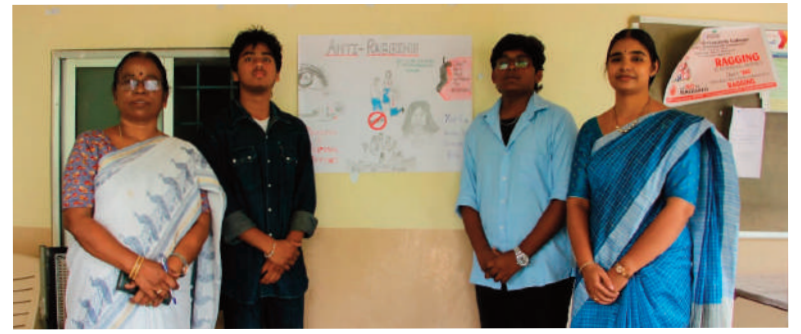
The video making competition was conducted in Room 208, MBA Block, from 2:30pm to 4:30pm. The main motto of

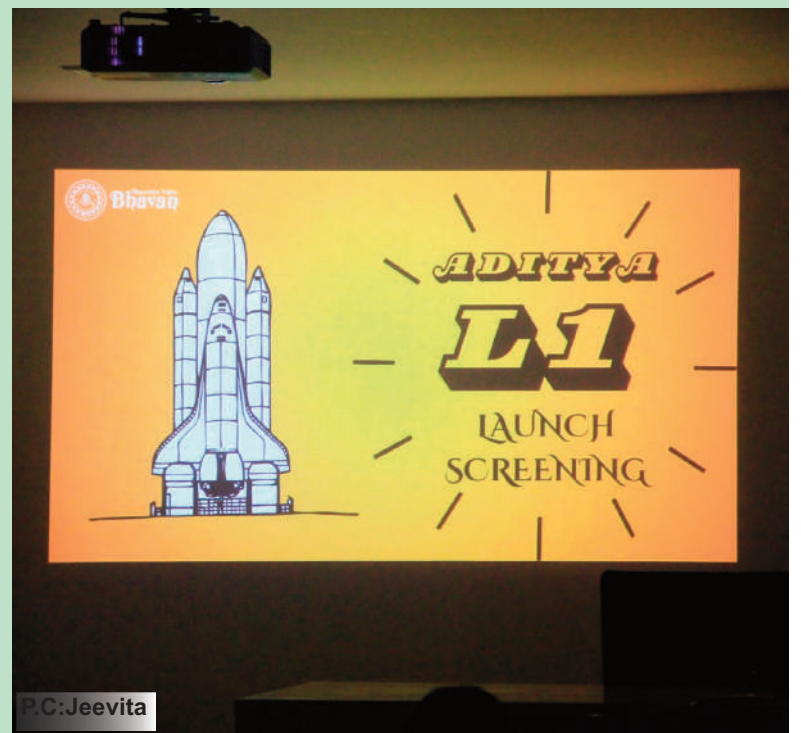
SCREENING OF ADITYA-L1 BY PSCIFE CLUB

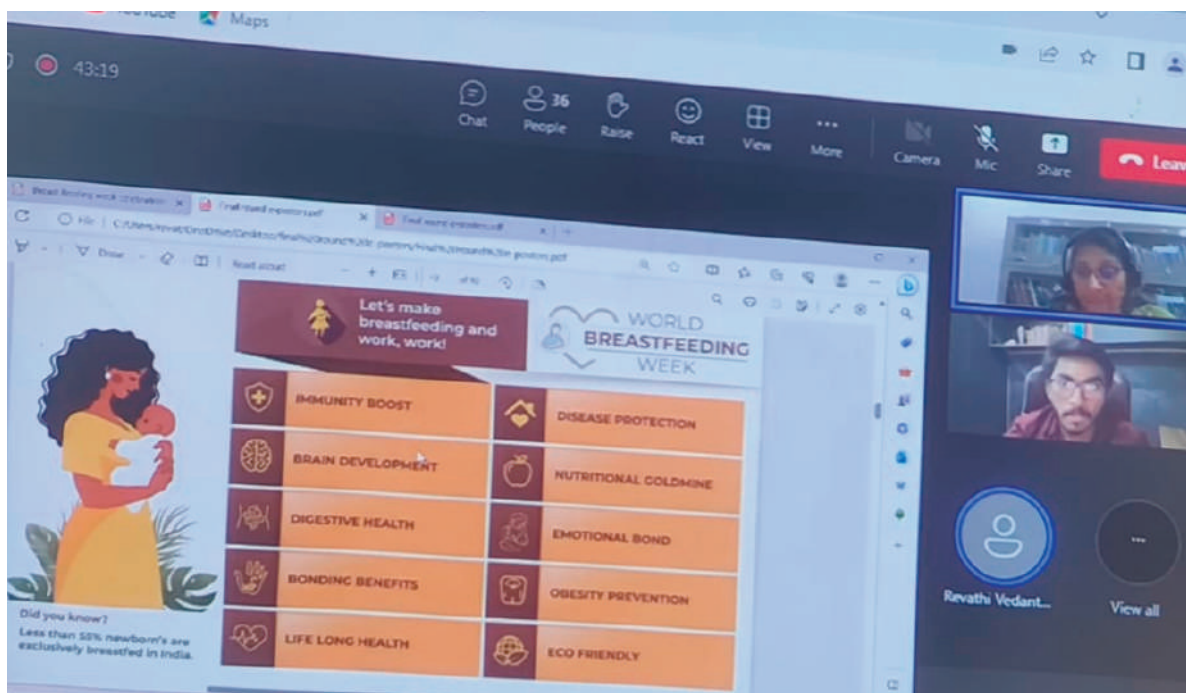
The volunteers were divided into groups and were allocated a topic out of cloth bags, organic farming, E-waste, yoga, millet lunch box, junk food and water management.

rity, Ramesh of their building and enquired for further details. He told the story in detail. The first drug injection was started just for fun. The political friend suggested taking then injection to improve their performance.

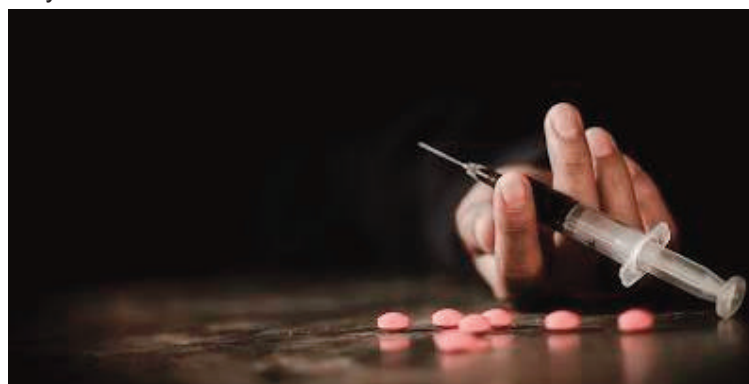

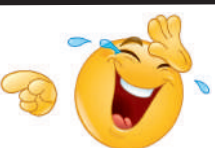

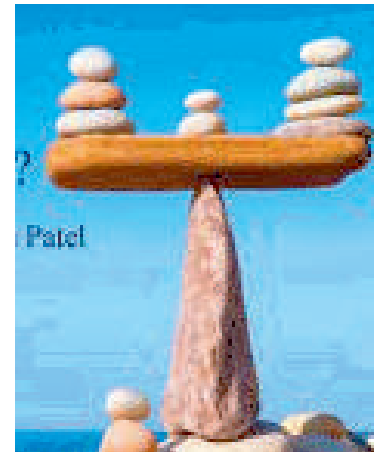

An Inconsolable death of Guru Dutt

Many eminent filmmakers come and go, but no one can be as iconic as Guru Dutt. Guru Dutt, aka Vasanth Kumar Shivashankar Padukone, is considered to be one of the best filmmakers in India. However, his life was fully melancholic. His personal life was full of tragedies and controversy, yet he produced several masterpieces for the film industry of India. Guru Dutt was a versatile actor, iconic filmmaker, producer, and also a choreographer. He was considered one of the few people in the industry who excelled in all of the skills he had. There are very few people who leave behind an indelible mark despite having a short span, and Guru Dutt was one of them.

Guru Dutt was born on the 9th of July in the year 1925 in Padukone, a princely state of Mysore, which is now in Bengaluru. Dutt came from an ordinary family, as many of us do, and didn't carry any legacy from his parents. Dutt entered the film industry as a choreographer. He made his directorial debut in the movie "Baazi," which was a hit film. Finally, it was time for "Pyaasa."

Many people in the film industry stated that Dutt had been planning for the film "Pyaasa" for a long time when he made his first film.

"Pyaasa" was a phenomenon. It was a pure gem and an industrial blockbuster hit. "Pyaasa" was a film made about a struggling poet who was ignored during his lifetime and gained fame after death. "Pyaasa" was the first Indian film to enter the top 100 films of the world, and still, only a few films from India have entered that list.

Guru Dutt had an enormous scope and made films in various genres. He didn't stick to making a single genre of films. His other movies included "Cid," "Mr. & Mrs. 55," and many others. Guru Dutt left a legacy behind in his use of camera lenses and lights, as his style of filmmaking and cinematography is still being used in 2023.

His use of close-up frames was named a shot in the film industry. Many filmmakers still use it, and it became known as "The Guru

Dutt Shot," in which the lens is mostly focused on the eyes of an artist, making the shot perfect. Guru Dutt was considered a man who was way ahead of his time. That's the reason his last film, "Kagaz Ke Phool," which was his biography, was criticized and a disastrous flop. This was the reason he stopped making films, and sadly, he committed suicide on the 10th of October 1964.

People didn't just criticize his films; they criticized his entire life, which he believed was one of the major reasons behind his death. It was also due to his personal life. He married Geeta Roy (Dutt) after the making of "Baazi," his directorial debut. Later, he fell in love with his co-actress Waheeda Rehman, which messed up his personal space. He left his wife and also Waheeda Rehman and was severely depressed about himself, which ultimately led to his demise.

Apart from his tragic personal life, Guru Dutt was the best filmmaker from the golden age of Bollywood. His legacy is peerless. He made fewer than 50 films in total, yet many of them were successful and brought fame to him. Due to his versatility, he had that fame in the film industry. His legacy is sublime, as evident through these brief writings.

Around 295 lives lost in Odisha train Accident

The grave accidents of train crashes began in the 1980's in India. The most unfortunate being the 1981 train crash resulting in the loss of a minimum of 800 lives. After investigating into the cause of these accidents, it pointed out various reasons such as mistakes in signaling train technology systems, and defects in tracks as well.

Fastforwarding to 2023, India witnessed yet another accident of three trains crashing into each other in the Balasore district of Odisha, on 2nd June 2023. The three trains involved were - Bengaluru-Howrah Superfast Express (12862), Shalimar-Chennai Central Coromandel Express (12841), and a goods train. It led to the loss of 295 lives and many who were injured.

The Ministry of Railways, while revealing the findings from the Commissioner of Railway Safety's report, stated that there were lapses in the signalling- circuit-alteration at North Signal Goomty station. Due to this unfortunate circumstance, the Coromandel Express entered the loop line, instead of the main line where the goods train was already parked. The impact of this crash derailed

another passenger train -- the Bengaluru-Howrah Superfast Express. This severe accident could have been prevented if India could have a wide safe technology network for railways. While India has a variety of such technologies, there is still a lot of scope for improvement. For instance, the installation of the Kavach system with the locomotive's TCAS systems

would have identified the loop line train in advance, thereby mitigating the severity of the tragic accident.

Prices of tomato skyrocketed

It is not just the Chandrayaan 3 that has reached the sky, the prices of tomatoes have too!

A staple in the Indian household, the humble tomato has made headlines in a rather dramatic fashion. On one hand we have Mr.Chandramouli, a tomato farmer from Andhra Pradesh who has made a whopping profit of 4 crores from selling over 40,000 boxes of tomatoes in a period of 45 days, while on the other hand, various incidents of kilos of tomatoes being stolen right before they were ripened have been reported. Fast food chains like McDonald's have excluded this commodity from their dishes due to lack of its availability. What exactly is the story behind this?

price increase. While tomatoes are cultivated in both the kharif and the rabi seasons, the rabi harvest is seen to be more profitable than the kharif. But because of the extreme temperatures and uncontrollable pest infestations throughout the months of March to April, there was a scarcity in production, which resulted in a smaller harvest and less profit during those months. This was followed by widespread severe rains

throughout the country's rabi season where the harvesting and transportation process have been adversely affected, explaining the price rise.

As a result of the price rise, consumers have started to reduce their tomato consumption. For low income households in particular, an essential kitchen commodity is being cut down due to financial restrictions. As costs have increased, restaurants and fast food sellers have been compelled to change their menus, and adjust the prices according

to the increase in costs of raw materials or completely eliminate tomatoes from their cuisine. Even the consumers were forced to settle for replacements or accept smaller serving sizes or higher prices for the dishes that contain tomatoes. Many farmers organizations claim that a rapid price rise in the market has little to no effect on the farmers average annual income.Despite making huge profits due to the spike in prices, many reports claim that this seasonal price rise does not hugely affect their annual income but only helps to compensate the losses they have incurred in the past. Samadhan Borate, a young farmer from pune shares that, more than the farmers,

It is the traders and middlemen who benefit greatly from this seasonal price hike, and that if the average rate of tomatoes is 150 or 180 per kg in the market, farmers receive only 40 per kg. It would definitely take some time for these prices to go down, as far as early September. An increase in tomato production and importing tomatoes from states with a surplus might help with this price decline according to the officials.

What's up with Chandrayaan-3?

The Chandrayaan 3, is the most recent lunar Indian space research exploration mission under the Chandrayaan program. The mission was launched by the Indian Space Research Organization(ISRO), on 14th July 2023 at 2:35pm from Sriharikota, Andhra Pradesh, India.

If this mission sees a successful soft landing, India will become the fourth country after the United States, Russia and China to have done so. India is developing step by step towards advancing its space technology and its presence in the global space community.

It consists of a lander named Vikram and a rover named Pragyan. These are similar to Chandrayaan 2 except that Chandrayaan 3 does not have an orbiter.

The main aim of these lunar explorations is to develop the space technology of India and to study in depth about the natural satellite of earth. The mission objectives of Chandrayaan 3 are, to demonstrate soft and safe landing on lunar surface, to demonstrate rover roving on the moon and to conduct in site scientific experiments.

The spacecraft will take approximately 42 days to reach the moon and is expected to make a landing on the moon surface on 23 August 2023.

MANIPUR IN TURMOIL : INDIA'S NORTH-EAST ON FIRE

In a concerning turn of events, the North-Eastern state of Manipur is witnessing violent upheaval, with at least 125 people killed, and around 50,000 people displaced from their villages. The escalating situation has drawn attention to the demands of the Meitei community, comprising 53% of the state's population, for inclusion in the Scheduled Tribes (ST) list, and the opposition from the Kuki and Naga tribes, constituting 40% of the population.

The Meitei community's request for ST status stems from their desire for reservations and cultural protection. They fear that unchecked illegal immigration from neighboring countries, such as Bangladesh and Myanmar, poses a threat to their land and jobs. Inclusion in the ST list could safeguard their culture and ensure better

representation in education and government jobs. Conversely, the Kuki and Naga tribes vehemently oppose this move, arguing that the Meitei community already holds significant political representation and privileges as an Other Backward Class (OBC). They fear that granting ST status would further marginalize them and curtail opportunities for their own communities. This has led to deep-rooted tensions and conflicts between the different ethnic groups.

The trigger for the recent violence was the Manipur High Court's suggestion to consider the Meitei community for ST status. In the aftermath, clashes broke out when rumors spread of Meitei attacks on tribal villages. Videos of civilians brandishing AK-47s raised alarm about insurgency and potential arms smuggling

from Myanmar. The Manipur situation not only raises internal concerns but also poses a geopolitical challenge for India. The region's proximity to Myanmar and Bangladesh and its critical location as a narrow corridor, often referred to as the "Chicken Neck," connecting the Northeast to the rest of India, necessitates a careful approach.

The influx of refugees from neighboring countries has also complicated matters. While India understands the plight of these displaced individuals, managing the influx without compromising the security and demographics of the region remains a delicate task.

Addressing the root causes of the conflict is crucial to prevent further escalation. The Meitei community's demand for inclusion in the ST list has not

even reached the first stage of the legal process, and the issue could be appealed in higher courts. Resorting to violence and street protests might not be the most effective solution.

Amid rising concerns about a 2.5-Front War, as warned by General Bipin Rawat, India must prioritize internal stability and unity among its diverse communities. Resolving the Manipur crisis requires a bal-

anced approach that protects the rights of all citizens while preserving the region's cultural and political identity.

As the nation grapples with these challenges, it is essential to sensibly handle delicate issues and work towards finding sustainable solutions. Internal conflicts can have severe implications for India's overall stability, and addressing them proactively is the responsibility of all citizens.

The five people who went underneath the water to see the titanic

Five people who went underwater to see the Titanic shipwreck went missing on June 18 in the Atlantic Ocean. They were in a submersible, which is similar to a submarine and they're often smaller. The coast guard of U.S announced they had found debris from the submersible near the Titanic site. The news was all over and missing vessel captured the world's attention for days.

The Rescue efforts began on Monday, June 19. It was Ocean Gate Expeditions estimated that

the passengers had about 96 hours of oxygen left. The vessel was programmed to send out a signal every 15 minutes to indicate its location.

One hour and 45 minutes later, the vessel lost contact and the Titan typically takes around two hours to reach the Titanic wreckage, located about 4,000m beneath the ocean and the vessel was carrying enough oxygen for the crew for 96 hours making the rescue mission a race against time to reach the vessel. A submersible called Titan has taken several

groups down to see the Titanic shipwreck. It was by a company called Ocean Gate Expeditions organized the trips.

They also said that there did not appear to be any connection between the underwater noises detected during the search and rescue mission and the location of the debris on the seafloor. About 90 minutes after going underwater, the craft lost contact with its support vessel. Governments in the U.S, Canada and other countries sent aircraft, ships and underwater equipment to help with the search

effort.

As the searchers had covered an area about half the size of Nova Scotia. A Canadian aircraft picked up banging noises deep in the ocean. Some people thought the sounds might have come from Titan. Officials now think the noises were unrelated.

In a news conference, U.S. coast guard Rear Admiral John Mauger said an ROV discovered a piece of the Titan. It was sitting on the sea floor about half a kilometre from the Titanic. It was a catastrophic implosion of the vessel,"

he said. An implosion is when something bursts inwards. It's not clear when the implosion happened. It's possible it happened as early as Sunday, when the submersible lost contact with its support vessel, according to a U.S. military official. US authorities say a debris field located in the North Atlantic leads to a conclusion that Ocean Gate's Titan submersible suffered a "catastrophic implosion" (a violent collapse inwards), instantly killing all five passengers on board.
